A listening ear, a warm, calm presence

In early 2018, I realized just how much the airmen at McEntire Joint National Guard Base could benefit from therapeutic animal interactions after I brought in two young dogs and a cat for resiliency visits following a loss. I saw how the mood lifted as engagement with the animals brought new life and opened lines of communication. I knew then that animal visits needed to continue, and I developed a plan for incorporating a trained assistance dog in my work of providing mental, emotional, and spiritual care for the members at the base.

I was referred to NEADS by my Mental Health Integration for Chaplain Services course supervisor, and the idea of acquiring an assistance dog for ministry at McEntire became a reality. Less than a year after I was accepted, I received the

call that I was matched with Assistance Dog Avalon.

When I first saw her, I teared up with joy and gratitude - our airmen, their families, and veterans would know the unconditional love and comfort of this special creature as she helped me build the heart and mind connection.

Avalon and I were welcomed with open arms by commanders and airmen alike when we arrived back from training at NEADS. This base support provided the undergirding for Avalon to be the first United States Air Force Therapeutic Support Dog for military under the Surgeon General's Human Animal Bond Program. The Department of Defense Therapeutic Support Dog program was started for the integration of certified organizational assistance dogs to beneficially support our service members.

Avalon has done so much in such a short time as we care for and minister to military personnel and veterans. Already her footprints are in hospitals and schools, at military honor funerals, churches, homes, the Air Force Chaplain Corps College at Maxwell Air Force Base (AFB), the South Carolina Adjutant General's offices, the Air National Guard Readiness Center at Andrews AFB, Shaw AFB, Fairchild AFB, Charleston AFB, Sheppard AFB, Keesler AFB, Army installations, Navy/Marine chaplaincy and even the Republic of Colombia in South America. We have also deployed as an Assistance Dog team, bringing with us a piece of home to strengthen the service members' resiliency in the mission as they adapt to being away from home. What is "String Training"?

When a Service Dog in Training is ready for its final finish training, it is placed with either a prison program handler or a NEADS trainer. We call the dogs placed with our trainers "string dogs," but where did this term originate?

The term "string dogs" came from the way our dogs were trained when we first opened the Princeton campus. We had a limited prison program at that time. Each trainer had 7-9 dogs that lived on campus and were trained daily by that trainer. These dogs were called the trainer's string of dogs. We have continued to use "string dog" to identify a dog assigned to a specific trainer that is being trained on campus after it leaves the Full-Time Raiser program and continues into final task training. The string dog resides in the Hawkins Canine Center during the work week and usually goes out for the weekend with an assigned Weekend Puppy Raiser.



Temperament Testing: Selecting and Assessing Future NEADS Service Dogs

One key trait of a Service Dog is its ability to connect and bond with its human partner. We seek dogs that naturally turn to their partner for guidance.

Before leaving the NEADS Breeding Center, typically around 7.5 weeks of age, each puppy undergoes a standardized behavioral assessment to identify its reaction to various environmental stimuli. We use the Behavior Checklist (BCL) to assess its strengths and weaknesses and how it interacts with handlers. Our goal is to gauge its confidence in various situations, so during the test, the puppy encounters different surfaces, wears a training cape, and is exposed to novel statues and loud noises. If a puppy is ever unsure of an object during the test, we like to see it looking to the handler for support in order to gain confidence and become self-assured enough to move forward.

The BCL, along with observations noted by the Breeding team during the puppy's first weeks of life, helps create a puppy's profile. This profile guides us in matching the puppy with a prison program handler or Full-Time Puppy Raiser as it takes the next step in its journey toward becoming a Service Dog.
